- Access the Coventry Foundation libraries located in Oceanside, CA and Columbia, SC. Right now, the information
 must be viewed at the libraries. The Foundation is working on digitizing the information so you can access it online in
 the future.
- Visit the Foundation museum in Petersburg, VA.
- Purchase Jaguar® related items from the Ebay store.
- Make a tax-deductible donation of Jaguar® cars and automobilia to the Foundation.
- Make a tax-deductible donation to the Foundation.

If you're looking for a nice "Jaguar related vacation" consider visiting the library in Columbia, SC and then visit the museum in Petersburg, VA. Or, if you're in a west coast mood, visit the library in Oceanside, CA. Do some research on your Jag while you're there and talk with the experts.

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
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
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


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
